And the Grant Goes to ...

BCF celebrated a year of bringing innovative solutions to Berrien County at our 72nd Annual Meeting & Celebration in September. And, we awarded \$269,000 in grants in less than two hours!

We announced the **BCF/Emerge** Micro-Loan program with Emerge Innovation Hub to offer loans to local entrepreneurs. This is the first initiative in Berrien Community Foundation's **Local Impact Investing** (also known as Program Related Investing) efforts. You can read more about this inside!

Outstanding Work

Berrien Community Foundation recognized one nonprofit and two community members for their standout work over the past year. The 2024 **Golden Acorn Award for Excellence** was awarded to **Neighbor By Neighbor** for their compassion and care for senior citizens living in Harbor Country. Neighbor By Neighbor got creative in helping low-income senior citizens stay safely in their homes through the "Help to Home" program. "Help to Home" does small home repairs for low-income seniors who are struggling to stay in and maintain their homes. Neighbor By Neighbor received a \$13,000 grant as part of the award. The increase was thanks to a grant from the Bonnie Benson Endowment Fund.

Just \$20 sends a **Senior Care Kit** to a vulnerable, homebound senior citizen in Berrien County.

One in 10 Berrien County seniors are living below the poverty level and, when out-of-pocket medical costs are factored in, that statistic turns into 1 in 7. To help bring some financial relief, we provide basic hygiene and care items in the form of these kits. We do also add some fun things like adult puzzle books and candy!

Every year, we hear from seniors expressing their gratitude to us, you and those who've financially contributed. Some tell us they wait to unwrap their kit until Christmas morning as it's the only present they receive.

While \$20 covers the cost to send one Senior Care Kit, donations of all sizes are appreciated!

Investing Here through Local Impact Investing

Berrien Community Foundation has set aside \$500,000 for **Local Impact Investing** (also known as Program Related Investing) to invest in local initiatives. These investments, made in the form of low interest loans, can be made to **for-profit or nonprofit organizations** as long as the primary purpose of the investment is a social benefit to our community.

"Housing, day care, placemaking, opportunities for employment — Local Impact Investing is a way to invest

right here in Berrien County," said BCF President Lisa Cripps-Downey.

Special consideration is given to endeavors that focus on job creation, social and environmental benefit, and economic growth in the community. Programs that use local contractors and materials and DEI indicators are also considered.

Helping Students Break Down Barriers

For some college students, an unexpected financial hardship could stand in the way from completing a semester or even graduating from college.

Berrien Community Foundations launched the **BCF Scholar Urgent Needs Scholarship Fund** this year to aid high-priority students overcome these financial hurdles.

Through a partnership with local donors and a donation from the Baird Wealth Management Charity Golf Outing, the fund will help students "when life happens."

"There are students who are making ends meet, working, going to class, paying rent and then an unexpected expense comes up, and they don't have enough at the end of the month to buy food," explained BCF Program Director Susan Matheny. "Or their car breaks down and they can't afford to get it fixed so they can get to class. That is



when the **BCF Scholar Urgent Needs Scholarship Fund** could kick in. Students who received a scholarship in 2024 will be eligible for urgent needs funding when life just happens."

Welcome to the team!


BCF welcomed Tanya Hagen to the team at the beginning of October.
